n August 2022, Pastor David preached a message on Matthew 5:13–16 wherein Jesus instructs us to be salt and light in the world so that others may see our good deeds and glorify our Father in Heaven. Subsequently, this passage and sentiment became the fall focus of the Adult Special Education (ASE) Ministry.

For those who have had the privilege of engaging with members of the ASE Life Group (also known as the "Happy Class") on Sunday mornings, you know that they are an energetic, live-outloud group that joyfully participates in worship and fellowship. Each member of the class takes that innocent joyfulness into their workplaces and communities every week and exemplifies Christ's charge to be salt and light.

Over the past several months, Happy Class volunteers have visited our class members to encourage them, but these visits quickly became an encouragement to us. Each time a visit was made, our class members would exclaim to their coworkers, friends, and case workers, "These are my friends! My church friends came to visit me!" Those visits provided us with such a sweet opportunity to witness our class members living out Jesus' call to be salt and light in the world.

In fact, the Happy Class is salt and light all over the city. On Green Springs Avenue, Calvin Morris dances with a street-sign at Firehouse Subs while James Sasser collects shopping carts and bags groceries at Publix. In North Birmingham, Jamichael McGhee cleans trays at Niki's West, and west of town, Anthony Derrico washes dishes in the cafeteria at Birmingham-Southern College. In Wildwood, Rene Bainbridge buses tables at Wendy's, while Penny Williams delivers pizzas for Papa John's downtown. And in Crestwood, Mary McPhillips works the front desk at the ARC.

Other class members live out the call to be salt and light by encouraging their friends and neighbors. Michelle Banks and Janie Reeves bake cookies and deliver them to neighbors. Thomas Campbell, Quinton Jones, and Rip Carper cheer on their group home members and caseworkers. Frank Owens and Curtis Harris sit on their front porches on Valley Avenue and wave to commuters. Kelly Ostrom lives in community at Episcopal Place. Steve Hatcher attends a weekday program at South Highland Presbyterian Church, and Kent Nunn and John David McCrorie lighten our hearts in class each week.

Shortly after Pastor David's message, the Happy Class studied Ephesians 4:1– 16. In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul reminded us that God blesses each person with specific gifts and abilities, and each person's gift is important to make up the complete body of Christ. Every member of the Happy Class fully embraces their gifts to cheerfully and eagerly be Christ's salt and light in the world so that others may see their good deeds and glorify our Father in Heaven.

GOD TRANSFORMS ONE

LIFE AT A TIME

THROUGH DAWSON'S KIDS CONNECTION MINISTRY

e looked about 17 years old. He will be a senior in high school this upcoming year. I greeted him (let's call him Andrew) and an older woman, who was holding an infant. She, (let's call her Susan), was cordial and thanked me for all the items they have received through "shopping" at Kids Connection. The clothes and other items meant so much to her and the children in her family. She stated how nice everyone was to her and she really appreciated that. Andrew said nothing and did not look at me. I thought, "I wonder what his story is." I prayed silently, "Lord, may your Holy Spirit touch his heart as You, Lord, speak to Andrew through me. I do not know really what he needs to hear."

I asked Susan if I could pray with them and she said, "Oh, yes, please. This is the main reason I come to Kids Connection so that someone can pray with me." I said, "Well, Susan, tell me a little about yourself, anything, and then your prayer requests." Andrew did not look up or respond...not seemingly wanting to engage in the conversation. However, Susan shared with me about her life, her life dreams, her walk with the Lord, and her prayer requests.

Listening. Yes, that is what we do as a part of the Spiritual Counseling Team at Kids Connection. And, praying. Sharing Christ. Hearts shared. Many needs are shared: physical, practical, spiritual, and emotional. Some needs are met. Specific devotional resources shared. Scriptures shared. Contact information about additional resources in the Birmingham Metropolitan area shared. Bibles given away. Hope given.

Back to Andrew and Susan. Susan and I visited for about 30 minutes. Andrew remained silent, head cast down, slouched in his chair. I asked Susan if she would mind if I visited with Andrew by himself. I thought he probably would not say

anything sitting right next to the adult figure he was with. Susan seemed pleased that I asked to visit with Andrew and went to walk around "the store" with the baby.

I prayed silently, "Lord, help me listen. Help me ask the right questions. Help me not 'rush' him. Open his heart to what he needs to share. Open his heart to You."

I asked Andrew to move to a closer chair to me and he did. I asked him to look at me and said, "Aren't you glad she is gone so you and I can visit?" He smiled. I told him this was not an interview or interrogation but that I really wanted to get to know him. I told him a little about myself—about having had teenage sons and a daughter and what a special and sometimes hard time of life it can be. His response was silence. More silence. I asked him what his life dream was. Silence. More silence. More silence. I'm praying. More praying. "Open his eyes Lord, his heart." May he trust me enough to speak. And then, Andrew spoke.

Andrew talked and talked and talked, sharing with me about his life, his regrets, his hopes, his guilt for poor decisions and bad behavior, his need for forgiveness by his family. He told me he was in foster care now, about six months, and deserved to be there. He said, "My mother does not want me." My brothers and sisters are afraid of me. I just want to be forgiven and go home. I am so angry." Now, it's my time to be silent. To have eye contact with him. Listening more. I indicated my sadness that he has been through so much and is suffering so. More listening. More looking at each other. Together. More silent praying by me. I asked him if he had one question he would like to ask me. Silence. Waiting. Looking at each other.

Then he spoke. He asked me, "How long do you have to pray about something before the prayer is answered? I have been praying and praying, and I do not know if God even hears my prayers. I mean I am praying a lot." More silence. A pause in the conversation. I prayed silently. I nearly wept. As a matter of fact, I almost fell out of my chair. Silence now looking at each other. Him looking at me. I'm looking at him. I prayed silently, "Thank you God, for Pastor David's sermon this past Sunday on 'How Long, O Lord?' Thank you, God, for preparing the way for this young man. For loving him enough to lead our pastor to change his sermon plans last Sunday so that I can share Your Word in response to Andrew's question. Thank you, Lord, always, for your perfect timing. Thank you, Lord, for your Holy Word, for the Scriptures you have shown me through the years on praying, seemingly unanswered praying, waiting, trusting, hope." More silence. Still looking at each other.

I leaned in a little bit closer to Andrew. I thanked him for asking such an important question. Only because of the awareness that the Holy Spirit was guiding our conversation, I responded, "Andrew, before I answer your question, I shared with him that he needs to do a few things: 1. Bring honest questions before God, which he is already doing; 2. Turn to God in the midst of questions, which he has done; 3. Trust God even when he does not have all the answers. I wrote down for him multiple Scriptures to read in addition to Psalm 13. I showed him where Psalms is in the Bible. I encouraged him to read through the Psalms. Specifically, I encouraged him to read and pray Psalm 27, Psalm 28, Psalm 22, and to trust God as found in Proverbs 3:5–6. approve it. They left, holding their heads high. Encouraged, grateful, with a sense of hope.

Yes, that is what God does through Kids Connection. He sends the people. He prepares hearts, directs and equips volunteers, and is always the God of Hope. He transforms lives.

Our visit extended beyond the time when Kids Connection should have closed. I thanked Bob Gowing, who serves there too. I asked Bob if we could pray together for Andrew and Susan after they left, and we did.

"HAVE YOU EVER ASKED CHRIST INTO YOUR HEART OR THOUGHT ABOUT ASKING GOD FOR FORGIVENESS OF YOUR SINS?" SILENCE.

I have an important question for you. Pause. Have you ever asked Christ into your heart or thought about asking God for forgiveness of your sins?" Silence. He leaned forward in his chair, looking at me. He said, "Well, I have thought about it and wondered how to become a Christian. I am now attending a private Christian school. I just do not know how to do that. I want to be a Christian." Silence. I just looked into his eyes. I said, "Would you like to pray asking God for forgiveness of your sins and asking Jesus into your heart, to follow him forever?" Without hesitation, he said, "Yes, yes. I really want to do that." I said, "Will you pray after me, a sentence at a time, asking Christ into your heart and forgiveness of your sins? Now?" He said, "Yes." We prayed. Afterward, now looking at each other. Thinking. More silent praving.

I spoke with Andrew about what it means to be a believer and responsibilities of a believer. I then said, "Now Andrew," and smiled, "You still want me to answer your question, "How long does it take before God answer's your prayer?" He said, "Yes, please. I just need to know."

I shared with him the teachings from Pastor David, focusing on Psalm 13. (I had my notes in my Bible from the sermon with me.) I also encouraged Andrew, saying that his question is not an unusual question and that many Christians, as well as people who are not Christians, have this question. He said, "I am glad you mentioned trust. I am trying to trust God with all my stuff. How do I get my family to trust me?" They won't let me come see them." I asked him if he understood why. He said he did; however, he has already been trying for a few months to do the right things and was praying. I reminded him that he does not need to carry his burdens or his sorrows alone anymore, but that Christ is with him and cares about everything in his life. I encouraged him to talk with his foster parent and social worker about his desire to see his family. Also, I encouraged him to write his mother a letter of apology, seeking forgiveness, while being willing for his foster parent and social worker to approve the letter. I reminded him that it may take awhile and a lot of doing the right things and making good decisions before he could be with his family again or build a new relationship with them. I encouraged him to be patient with himself, with God, and with others. Take baby steps. Make good decisions. Read his Bible. Pray. Wait. Hope.

He said he would. I asked him if he would, in front of me, tell his foster parent about his decision to follow Christ. And, would he tell her that he wants to write his mother a letter. He said, "Yes." He told Susan his decision and she just hugged him, saying over and over, "Thank you, Jesus." He also told her he wanted to write his mother a letter and that she could read it and While we know the names of those who come to Kids Connection and the names of their children served, we do not know their hearts. However, we know that the great I AM knows. I thank God for being able to serve at Kids Connection in Spiritual Counseling. I thank God for our pastor who is sensitive to and follows the leadership of the Holy Spirit. I thank God for a church whose vision is to serve and reach others for Christ.

Months later, Andrew's foster parent shared how God has unbelievably changed him. His new life in Christ is now seen in his eagerness and faithfulness to attend church and read his Bible, in being a conscientious student at school, and in helping with responsibilities at home.

What a privilege it is to rejoice with those who love Him and follow Him. What a privilege it is to pray for the shoppers and the children. What a privilege it is to hear the heartfelt prayers of shoppers who thank God for Kids Connection, for Dawson, and for the volunteers. Yes! Praise God for transforming lives forever through Kids Connection. Praise God from Whom all blessings flow! Amen!

hen I was a junior in high school, God called me to ministry, specifically music ministry, which led me to Samford to pursue a degree in worship leadership. Once I got to Samford, I realized that I needed to find a church that would not only pour into me but allow me the opportunity to serve God's people. During my first semester of college, Dawson became that place. It became not only a place, but a community of people with whom I could share grief and joy, that helped me heal from past hurts, and that modeled what it means to be filled with the Spirit.

Once I'd decided that I wanted to call Dawson home away from home, Blake Jenkins and Kara Fincher, our College leaders, began to nudge me toward the BETA internship program. I'd expressed to them a desire to serve as well as a need for financial support for school. At that point, BETA had only been around for a couple of years, but it seemed like an answered prayer. I would gain experience in my field, a strong spiritual community, and a scholarship. So, as a rising sophomore, I decided to apply to the program with nothing but my growing relationship with Jesus and an eagerness to serve. As He always does, the Lord provided abundantly more than I would ever have thought to ask for, and I became a BETA Intern in the Music & Worship Ministry.

The first thing I did as a BETA intern at the kickoff retreat

was learn what it actually means to be a BETA intern. The word "Beta" is actually a mountain climbing term that refers to the "step-bystep description of a sequence of a climb." I have learned that this is a well-chosen descriptor of what it is to be a part of this program at Dawson.

I LED MY FIRST MISSION TRIP AS A CAMPUS MINISTRY INTERN. LESS THAN A YEAR OUT OF COLLEGE, I TOOK A TEAM OF UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS FROM ATHENS, GEORGIA, TO MONTERREY, MEXICO, DURING SPRING BREAK.

We left in the middle of the night, driving two 15-passenger vans. Long before the age of cell phones and navigation systems, we had just a road atlas in each van and a pair of walkie-talkies to communicate with one another. And, just to be safe, we also packed a box full of engine parts in case the older van broke down along the journey.

Looking back, I realize going on a trip like that probably sounds *absolutely crazy*. I would never, today, encourage a group of college students to drive thousands of miles and cross an international border unsupervised. Yet, those were different times. I, along with my team, believed God had called us on this mission. We went out in faith, trusting in God's protection and provision. God was faithful to us every step of the way, and we returned safely home after a week of incredible ministry.

I loved every aspect of the trip: the planning, the coordinating with national partners, the helping participants navigate the experience. At every turn, it was like God was confirming something within me. The work was joyous and natural and full of purpose.

One summer, I had just returned from church camp and I felt a clear impression from God. He was calling me to serve Him with my life and work. God clarified this direction during my college years with a calling to Christian ministry. Leading the team to Mexico further focused that calling to missions. After college, I took a position as a student minister in my home church. As a congregation active in missions, I had many opportunities to join short-term teams in various places around the world. The trips helped shape my understanding of missions and the global church. Also during this time, I set out to read every missionary biography I could find. I was in awe of the lives of Jim and Elisabeth Elliot, Hudson Taylor, Rees Howells, Adoniram Judson, C.T. Studd, and many others. They heard the call of God, left all the trappings of home behind, and went out into the unknown of faith.

With a calling to ministry and missions, I started asking God *where* He wanted me to serve. I found myself a little envious, in a way, of the missionary greats I read about. They all seemed to have a calling to a place or to a people group. This was conspicuously absent from my own calling. I remember asking God to give me similar clarity.

I prayed, "I will go anywhere, God! Just tell me the *place*."

And God, as He so often does, had a different plan. I realized He was not so much interested in the question, "Where?" Rather, He was focused on a "Who?" Now, do not get me wrong, God does still call people to serve in specific places. This was just not my story. You see, God was doing a work deep inside my heart. He was teaching me to trust Him, for everything—without a road map. He was more concerned with who I was becoming than where I was going.

Through these formative experiences, a theme emerged in my ministry. God gave me a burden to connect the church to the world. I had seen the powerful potential to change lives through short-term mission trips. When done well, these trips not only bless the ministry partner and help reach the unreached, but they also serve as a spiritual catalyst for the participant. A week or two outside of one's comfort zone can produce the raw materials for God to do something special. Without the distractions of our daily routine, God seems nearer, his voice clearer. As in my own life, I saw others yield themselves fully to the Lord in these thin places where we can glimpse God's Kingdom on earth.

Many years after my initial calling, the disparate pieces of ministry and missions were coming together. I knew God was

calling me to be a connector, to be a *bridge*. I wrote about the vision. I talked with my pastors and closest friends. It seemed so right and obvious, yet hurdles remained. In those days, the category of missions ministry in the church was undeveloped. I had a calling without a clear path forward.

This is a critical juncture in my story. Through mutual friends and shared experience in ministry, God brought Ali, my wife, into the picture. As only God can orchestrate, He had given each of us a very similar vision for missions and ministry. When we married, we were joined as husband and wife, *and* as partners in ministry. We now shared the vision of *the bridge*, and had a calling together.

I HAVE CALLED YOU. BE PATIENT. WAIT ON ME. THOUGH YOU CANNOT SEE IT, I AM WORKING. BE FULLY PRESENT AND SERVE ME WHERE I HAVE YOU. I learned a very important lesson over the next few years: God's timing does not directly correlate to my own. I had a vision for ministry, and I thought I understood what it should look like. As Ali and I took steps forward in obedience to the call, the available opportunities often seemed to pull us further from the picture I held in my mind. While this was happening, I found comfort in God's words spoken through Habakkuk: "For still the vision awaits its appointed time; it hastens to the end-it will not lie. If it seems slow, wait for it; it will surely come; it will not delay" (2:3). I sensed God saying, I have called you. Be patient. Wait on me. Though you cannot see it, I am working. Be fully present and serve me where I have you.

Year after year, the core of the vision

to be a bridge between the American church and the world remained constant. The pursuit of obedience to God took us to unexpected places. We traveled countless miles on short-term and mid-term mission trips. We sold our home and our cars so we could live lean and respond quickly to needs. I worked as a carpenter and contractor to have more vocational flexibility between mission projects. When our children were young, we were invited to serve with a ministry in Latin America for two years. Each experience, though not a full representation of my personal vision, provided a piece of the whole. We were on a long road of calling, believing God would give us enough direction to take the next step.



I always trusted I would eventually work in the local church. With this in mind, we moved from Latin America to Birmingham for me to attend seminary at Beeson Divinity School. While there, Ali and I served as Missionaries in Residence with Samford University Ministries. We had the wonderful opportunity to work with Third-Culture Kids and students with a vocational interest in missions. In this season, I developed a theological framework for missions and ministry that can only come from studying God's Word in community with other believers.

This experience opened a new and unforeseen chapter in our calling story. In what seemed like a detour, I spent the next decade working in higher education. The bulk of this time I worked with international students. I was serving as *the bridge* in reverse. Instead of connecting the church

to the world, the world was here! I had the wonderful task of connecting students with one another, with domestic students, and with the local community. Though this was far from what I expected, I trusted God was at work. I loved the students yet felt a disconnect from my original ministry calling. But God confirmed over and again I was in the right place...for now.

There were many times the gap between what I was doing professionally, and what I believed I should be doing, seemed like a vast chasm. Proverbs 13:12 states, "Hope deferred makes the heart sick..." My heart often ached to serve God and see the vision that I knew He gave me come to fruition.

I AM INCREDIBLY THANKFUL ALI AND I ARE SERVING AT A CHURCH WITH SUCH A RICH HISTORY IN MISSIONS ENGAGEMENT. God helped me to understand that my work, though not in a church setting, was *ministry*. My profession did not change my identity or calling. Sometimes God would remind me of this in the quietness of prayer, other times it was through challenges. It was a lesson not easily learned. Yet, He remained a patient teacher. He helped me to learn contentment and how to be fully present where He placed me.

At just the right time, God opened the door for me to join the ministry team at Dawson. I am reminded of the second line of Proverbs 13:12,"...but a desire fulfilled is a tree of life." This is what I have always felt called to do. I am incredibly thankful that Ali and I are serving at a church with such a rich history of missions engagement.

I can see now that my experiences

have shaped and prepared me for His purpose and for His calling. Though the road to get here was long, I would not trade a single moment of the journey.

id you know that every Christian is called to missions? The Great Commission is not a directive to just certain believers; it is an invitation to joyfully participate in God's redemptive plan, and it's for all followers of Christ. God has uniquely designed each one of us with specific and useful gifts. Paul writes: God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as He chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body (1 Corinthians 12:18–20). We are all called, and we all have a role to play.

Joy comes in serving when you find your place. We each have a specific calling to use our unique gifts in the mission of God. We, as a church, are called to train and develop disciples and send them out to expand the Kingdom of God. This is what we call "mobilization." And one of our important roles is to help with navigating this process.

Some may want to serve in a physical location. You might look at the list of Dawson mission trips and feel God's call to a country, city, or people group. Others may be called to serve with a specific ministry or area. Rest assured, God will burden your heart to share the Gospel with the unreached and to use the gifts He has given you. This can happen in a variety of ways. For instance, you may not currently be able to go on that mission trip, however, you may have a strong desire to intercede for our mission teams and ministry partners. Or, God may prompt you to help the team prepare for the trip. Others may seek to serve missionaries who are on furlough or drive departing mission teams to the airport. You may even choose to lend your time and talents at Kids Connection, The Learning Center, or M-Power. We are all called, and we all have a role to play.

One of our Theological Vision statements is "Missions is our passion." This passion comes from a century of faithfully loving and serving others outside the walls of the church. Missions is central to our identity of who we are as a church. God has uniquely called our church family to missions, and we serve out of the overflow of His love.

This vision also reflects a future reality. As each of us learn to walk in our own calling to further God's Kingdom, we will find ourselves operating from a deeper understanding of God and of our role in His redemptive story. Through Dawson, God is mobilizing us to joyfully serve Him. This is why Missions is, has been, and will always be our passion!

Living in response to the good news is the call to all believers. Because we have received the gospel of Christ, we are to fully embrace a life that offers this glorious gift to others.

hile the Gospel message is singular and clear, the display of this Christian life is a colorful kaleidoscope, a multi-faceted diamond reflecting the light of Christ for all to see. (Colossians 3:17).

We are united in obedience to the Greatest Commandments and Great Commission, but the way we live this out is as different and unique as God has created each of us to be.

In 2017, God softened my heart to see how I could be of use in sharing the Gospel in a new and, admittedly, unexpected way. Because of my experiences as a Bible teacher and collegiate athlete, I was invited to be part of a ministry team that went to women's prisons to share the love of Christ. This organization, Sports Reach, was connected to my local church, and my mentor, Tina, was to lead the weeklong trip. The plan was that our team-composed of women aged 18-48 with varying backgrounds ranging from music ministry to a volleyball team captain-would go into a maximum security women's prison, share the good news of the Gospel with the inmates, and then play a sports game or two.

We quickly found that what the prisoners wanted was not a competitive softball tournament or even a sermon. What they desired was to be heard and to be received with grace. Those hot days spent out on the yard were much less about anyone's athletic ability and much more about the love of Jesus. Through the means of sport, we connected with people who we found to be much more like us than different. We met believer and unbeliever alike in these moments, being used by God and being sharpened by God in the most unlikely of places.

I served as team member or team

leader for these types of trips for a few years. And I would do it on an annual basis if I could! It was in those prison chapels-not on a church platform or behind a proper pulpit-where I practiced my Bible teaching, which served me greatly when I later took on the role of Women's Minister and Children's Minister at Porter Memorial Baptist Church. From these experiences, I was connected with my seminary to teach in local jails. And through those opportunities I was later connected to a prison educational program where I have served most recently.

These programs can be found all over the country, from Kentucky to Florida to Texas. This sort of ministry was never one that I would have identified with or found on my own, but it is what God placed in my path. Serving with them has stretched my comfort zone and my abilities. During these times, I have been made to rely on the Lord and to trust Him in each next step. He used an ordinary individual, with an ordinary makeup of gifts (and flaws) for His glory in this way. When God places opportunities, even ones maybe as foreign to you as serving those in prison, will you step out in faith?

My experiences in these places have drawn me closer to Christ. These times have caused me to see more clearly the great grace that the Lord extends to each of us. In all places are people in darkness, with our sin and need. And to all places, including the seemingly hopeless and often forgotten prison cell, the light of the Gospel can reach. The light of Christ extends to these places as our Savior is sufficient to meet our great need. Will you remember that truth as God calls you? Will you step out, with the light of Christ, to even the darkest places?

In response to the Gospel, may we go with the compassion of Christ to anywhere and everywhere Christ calls.

"Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body." Hebrews 13:3 (ESV)

The Spiritual Discipline

of Silence & Solitude

esus invites you to come away with Him. Not because you should. Not even out of obedience. Not because it's a duty. But because He loves you. Because He think you are special. Because you are worthy of His time, and He want to be with you.

The Lord calls to us, men and women, to a level of relationship and connection for which our souls long. It's what we were created for. The busyness around us, of this world, calls loudly. Work, productivity, volunteering, the raising of children, obligations, media, and constant availability. We live in a place full of commerce, social engagements, social media, news media, and distractions—all manner of enticement for our focus, our time, and our devotion.

The Lord's voice can be hard to hear in the midst of all that. His creation reminds us of Him, but do we pause very often in wonder, in awe? God created the beauty of this world, the relationships we enjoy. He created work and family. He modeled serving others. All of these are good! But when these gifts are our focus and we become distracted from the Lover of our souls, they become diversions, even barriers, to what Jesus called the better way: quietly sitting at the feet of Jesus and learning from Him.

Did you know that you have received an invitation? A personal invitation, sent with love and addressed to you? Jesus calls you "Beloved" and invites you to come away with Him. I can imagine Him saying this to me: "Find rest for your weary soul. I will give you rest. The world gives you yokes. So many of them. But I want to exchange all of those for the one I have prepared for you. Come, take this one. It is easy; this one is light. I want you to learn from me, one-on-one. Like my personal apprentice. But it's not work or another thing to add to your list. Oh no, I have hand selected you. Not because of anything you have that will benefit me. No, I picked you out because you are special in my eyes. Because I know everything about you and love you unreservedly. There are things I want to show you. A new work that I want to do. I want you to spend time with me; just with me. I am gentle and lowly in heart, easy to get along with. I'm not calling you here to berate you or chastise you about anything. I just want to spend time with you. Time that you have set apart, recognizing that I truly am your best thought by day or by night."

Longing bor peace? Ob course you are. Need rest bor your weary soul? Absolutely.

Jesus invites all who labor and are heavy laden to come to Him. We just need to accept his invitation. Longing for peace? Of course you are. Need rest for your weary soul? Absolutely. God said it would be this way! He longs to fill that space. But we have to make space for Him to fill. So what can we do about that?

Recently, Kristen Torres, Minister of Spiritual Development and Women's Ministry, and I took a much needed break from everyday life, each of us sensing the need to get away with God. We went to a serene space about an hour away, a place specifically set aside for this purpose. Both of us realized that God was moving us in similar directions. As we listened to God and poured out our hearts to each other, we knew we were not alone in this. Most women we know feel the same kinds of pressures, busyness, and longings for God.

Last summer the Dawson Women's Ministry podcast, *Everywhere You Are*, curated a series focusing on spiritual disciplines. Women from Dawson shared their stories of connecting with God through prayer, lament, studying Scripture, worship, and silence and solitude. Last fall, Jan Kennamer Hart led a Wednesday-night series that explored spiritual disciplines, which is again offered this spring. Also, Dawson's Women's Ministry hosted three 5-hour quiet retreats last September, October, and November.

What is a quiet retreat, you ask? It's really just space. Making space, on our campus, for people to spread out, to find a quiet nook or cranny (or Life Group room, or pew, or comfy chair) to get away and be alone and quiet with God, the Lover of our souls. We started and ended by calming our bodies and focusing on Scripture and quietly stretching our muscles. As we were doing this, I recognized the tension and stress I was carrying physicallymy vokes-and then released them to the Lord. Then I was able to become calm and focused on God, shutting the door to all that clamors for my attention and fully opening the door to Him. Quieting the noise of the world so I could hear the still, small voice God most often uses. Prompts helped us to get started, but then we made use of the weekday guietness of the Dawson space and just met with God individually.

In the Spring, Dawson's Women's Ministry is planning a weekend retreat April 14–16. It won't be your usual women's retreat of Bible study, worship, and fellowship, although that sounds nice too! This one will be for those longing to get away, to have a break, to hear God in the quiet, peacefulness of a beautiful place away from all that calls for our attention every day. And yes, you are invited!

"Come away with me," calls the Lord. That's what we are going to do. Carve out space to hear God, to connect deeply with Him, to find real and deep refreshment for our souls. To paraphrase a mentor of mine, "Let us wait upon the Lord and see what He is going to do!"

us is the call to invest in the next generation. In Psalm 145:4, we're reminded: One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts. As we choose to share our testimony, time, and talents with the next generation, the Lord stirs the hearts of a new generation of worship leaders, pastors, and prayer warriors.

Through a variety of ministry opportunities, the Dawson Music Academy prioritizes an intentional investment in the next generation of worship leaders. Sometimes that investment comes in the form of private weekly music lessons to develop a student's individual talents to sing or play in worship. However, sometimes the investment takes a different path.

Ignite Student Bands provide a pathway for youth musicians to explore their talents while also gaining new insights about leading in worship.

ne of the most important callings that God gives Ignite Bands first launched several years ago when a few Dawson Music Academy instructors had a vision to invest in the next generation of worship leaders. After prayerfully exploring several different ideas, the instructors created Ignite Bands. The name "Ignite" reflects the goal of the bands: to "ignite" a love for music, a connection with other musicians, and a passion to lead in worship.

> In keeping with our commitment to invest in the next generation, Ignite Bands provide opportunities for young musicians, ranging from elementary-age to high school, to explore their talents with other musicians. Each Ignite Band includes a small group of 4-8 band members of similar age and ability level. In weekly sessions, vocalists, guitarists, keyboardists, and drummers come together to rehearse worship songs. Students and coaches create the playlist of worship songs each semester. Some of the favorites through the years have been "How Great Is Our God" (Tomlin), "Glorious Day"



(Ingram & Smith), and "House of the Lord" (Wickham). Led by an Academy Band Coach, each rehearsal provides students the opportunity to develop new musical skills while also learning how to lead in worship. Band Coaches collaborate with band members to create song maps for each of the songs they are playing. Through these discussions, band members think through different dynamics that are important to incorporate when serving and leading in worship. At the end of each semester, Ignite Bands host a Band Showcase where they lead their family and friends in a night of worship.

Through the years, a variety of different students have participated in Ignite Bands. Many of the students and their parents have shared with me that Ignite Bands have provided an encouraging foundation for students both musically and spiritually. The soundtrack of worship songs learned through Ignite Bands has encouraged teenagers on difficult days, through challenging times, and through lonely seasons. The promises of scripture sung over the seasons of life is a firm foundation that won't be shaken.

In addition to building a strong spiritual foundation, Ignite Bands provide a positive connection point for youth to build relationships. Some of our Ignite Band students have been part of bands since their beginning in 2018. It has been truly amazing to watch those students grow in their friendships with each other over the past several years. The strong relationship between band members helps them as they learn to communicate with each other about musical details (how fast to play, how loud to play, which instrument has the lead, etc.). Band members also develop new musical skills of listening to the group and following the band leader. They grow in their confidence with playing their musical instrument as well as in their ability to lead others in worship.

Ignite Bands are open to any interested

musician, not only students at Dawson Music Academy. We've had some students from other Birmingham-area churches join Ignite Bands for one semester to gain musical experience in worship. After a semester, those students felt prepared with the skills they needed to participate in youth worship bands at their churches, so they plugged into their local church leadership teams. Additionally, several Ignite Band students have moved on to serve as leaders in worship at Dawson or other area churches. We're grateful for the opportunity to equip and encourage these young musicians to use their God-given talents in worship.

As we look ahead, we're excited to continue to invest in the next generation of worship leaders through Ignite Bands. It's a privilege to connect with youth and "ignite" a love for music and worship. Thank you for joining with us in prayer for the worship leaders of tomorrow!

You're on a deserted island, what three things do you bring with you?


Can I have my phone? Because then I'd have my Bible, and music, and all the things. And water and chocolate.
